OS annual meeting postponed due to virus

WOODSTOCK – Operation Sharing's board of directors unanimously decided to postpone the organization's annual meeting due to concerns surrounding the corona virus.

"It was a no-brainer," said Marilyn Schmiedl, board president. The annual meeting had been scheduled for March 19 and will now be held at a future time yet to be announced.

"We're following the general guidelines surrounding the virus," Schmiedl said, noting that public gatherings are being curtailed around the world to help prevent the spread of the virus. Even casual

contact is said to open the door for its spread.

The board, in particular, had concerns about spreading the virus to elderly family members with respiratory problems.

There are mass shutdowns of businesses, churches and other organizations throughout the world as the battle against the virus continues.

The meeting postponement comes on the heels of what is being described as a challenging 2019 for Operation Sharing.

Stephen Giuliano, the organization's chaplain/executive director, said in his 2019 annual report that Operation Sharing's homeless shelter was the target of "unfounded" accusations and this situation has been addressed. Then, the Bullwinkle's Eatery/ Hospitality Training Centre relocated from the Moose Family Centre to Indwell's Harvey Woods Lofts and "things are going great!"

The Ingersoll Food for Friends site also had to relocate due to St. James

Anglican Church being sold in the spring. The program now runs out of Trinity United Church.

Finally, "our financial situation looks much 'greyer' than it previously looked in recent past years. This is due to both an increase needed for programs, and a decrease in community donations


The Inn
